CONJUNCTION – is a word that joins words or groups of words in a sentence

Some examples are: and, but, or -----these are called coordinating conjunctions

(either; or), (neither; nor), (both; and) – correlative conjunctions pairs

Coordinating Conjunctions:

Examples: 1. Mary and I are both students. (compound subject) introduce an idea

- 2. We can <u>study</u> at school <u>or go</u> to the library. (compound predicate) introduce a choice
- 3. I stayed at school, but Mary went to the library. (compound sentence) introduce contrasting idea

Student Examples:

I went to my brined house, but he wasn't there.

I had the option of <u>eating</u> chicken nuggets for dinner or eating burger.

My <u>brother</u> and I were both scared.

Correlative Conjunctions:

Example: 1. Either Lucy or I will use the atlas.

- 2. My mom said that neither Jimmy nor Janet can go to the field trip.
- 3. Both Tokyo and Hiroshima are in Japan.

Student Examples:

We can either leave or go right ahead and walk in secretly.

Both Susan and Mary went to the store.

My teacher said neither Jack nor Luke may play at recess.
